Technical setup

- 1. A TV or video projector with screen

The learned parrots

The Tale

Questions

These questions are suggestions to be adapted according to the participants. Depending on the audience, do not hesitate to rephrase the questions and to propose new ones.

- 1. What does this story tell?
- 2. What do you think of the two learned parrots?
- 3. What about the third parrot?
- 4. What is the main weakness of the 2 parrots?
- 5. What are the qualities of the wild parrot?
- 6. How could the master of the 2 parrots have prepared them to live in the wild?
- 7. Who do you think is happier: the caged parrots or the free-range parrot?
- 8. Give examples in which experience has been as useful as knowledge (e.g. cycling).
- 9. Name some areas where experience is much more important than knowledge (DIY, gardening, artistic fields,...). And vice versa?
- 10. Name examples in which experience has enriched your knowledge. For example for a recipe.
- 11. How does vanity serve you?
- 12. What is discernment? What can it do for you in your daily life?
- 13. What did the two parrots learn?
- 14. What is the most important thing for you?

To amplify; here is a comment from the author

'Certainly knowledge is an important thing, but in life, for the essential things, you will need know-how. It's about feeling, experiencing and practicing.'
